Good News!

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) has increased government-nonprofit partnerships at once in a generation levels.

State, local, Tribal, and territorial governments must obligate their specific allocations of the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) by the end of 2024 and spend them by the end of 2026.

Government Guiding Principles

- Prioritize equity from the outset
- Invest in economic multipliers
- Implement quickly, yet fairly
- Maintain accountability via reasonable documentation and transparency











Steps to Partner



- Understand how your local government operates
- Introduce yourself to local governments
- Build the relationship
- Know how decisions are made



Understand How Your Local Government Works

- Research websites
- Connect with peers
 - Organizational charts/strategic plans/budgets
 - Where does your government get money?
 - How does it spend money?
 - How is the money allocated by the local government?
 - How do decisions get made?



Introduce Yourself to Local Governments

- Make a connection
- Set up a meeting
 - Organization
 - Need you are addressing
 - Solutions you provide
 - How you can help them
- Accept and act on feedback
- Attend public forums and meetings



- Work through the system
- Understand their motivations—recognize their efforts when appropriate



Know How Decisions are Made

- Public comment, committees, boards, elected officials, etc.
- Formal process for submitting requests?
- Slow and sometimes crazy fast
